Dear Governor Brewer:

The purpose of this letter is to notify you that the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) intends to designate a portion of Pinal County as “nonattainment” for the 2006 24-hour fine particle (PM_{2.5}) national ambient air quality standard (NAAQS), and to inform you of the status of our redesignation actions for the 1997 annual PM_{2.5} and 1987 24-hour coarse particle (PM₁₀) standards.

On October 14, 2009, my predecessor, Laura Yoshii, sent you a letter informing you that, based on recent violations of the PM_{2.5} and PM₁₀ NAAQS in Pinal County, EPA had determined that changes to air quality designations within your state would be necessary. These changes would include promulgation of an initial area designation for the 2006 24-hour PM_{2.5} NAAQS, a revised designation for the 1997 annual PM_{2.5} NAAQS, and a revised designation for the 1987 24-hour PM₁₀ NAAQS.

Thank you for your March 23, 2010 letter, in which you recommended that Pinal County retain its current designation of “unclassifiable/attainment” for the 1997 annual PM_{2.5} NAAQS and provided a recommended nonattainment area boundary for the 1987 24-hour PM₁₀ NAAQS.

Designation for the 2006 24-hour PM_{2.5} NAAQS.

Although EPA finalized designations for the 2006 24-hour PM_{2.5} NAAQS for most areas last October, air quality monitoring data collected from 2006–2008 indicated that Pinal County was newly violating the standard. We decided to defer final action for Pinal County, as well as eight surrounding counties¹, so that we could collect and evaluate additional information sufficient to assess the area before promulgating designations.

We have completed our evaluation and intend to designate a portion of Pinal County as “nonattainment,” as described in the enclosed detailed analysis. We intend to designate the

remaining State lands in Pinal County as well as the remaining eight deferred counties as “unclassifiable/attainment.” Should you have additional information that you wish to be considered by EPA in this process, please provide it to us by June 18, 2010, as we intend to make final designation decisions for the 2006 24-hour PM_{2.5} NAAQS in August 2010.

Redesignation for the 1997 annual PM_{2.5} NAAQS.

Based on our analysis, we have determined that the violating monitor in Pinal County is not eligible for comparison with the annual PM_{2.5} NAAQS.² Therefore, EPA intends to retain the “unclassifiable/attainment” designation for Pinal County, Arizona, for the 1997 annual PM_{2.5} NAAQS.

Redesignation for the 1987 24-hour PM₁₀ NAAQS.

We have not yet completed our review of the documentation you provided in support of your recommended nonattainment area boundary. We will notify you of our intended designation when we have completed our evaluation, and will provide an opportunity for you to comment on the proposal.

We look forward to continuing to work with you and your staff to develop area designations. After promulgation of the new 24-hour PM_{2.5} NAAQS designation for this area, EPA will work with your staff to develop an appropriate State Implementation Plan to assure the public health protections intended by the standard.
