

At the next label printing the "if in eyes" statement in the statement of practical treatment should be revised as follows:

If in eyes - Flush eyes with plenty of water. Call a physician immediately.

Your statement of non-warranty is noted on your draft labeling of December 23, 1981, and in the final printed labels submitted July 9, 1982. Mr. Harrison's letter of July 29, 1977, is also noted, and we have no objections to your revised statement of non-warranty transmitted in your letter of July 19, 1977. However, I have enclosed a memorandum dated July 31, 1978, from Edward C. Gray to Edwin H. Johnson. The subject of the memorandum is "Warranties, Disclaimers and Limitations on Pesticide Labels." On pages 3 and 4, unspecified weather conditions that negate warranties are discussed. The point to be made is it would be advisable to print on your labels what weather conditions are acceptable, not merely a disclaimer about "extraordinary weather conditions."
