## I. General Information

Distinct<sup>TM</sup> herbicide is a selective postemergence herbicide for the control of annual broadleaf weeds, control or suppression of many perennial broadleaf weeds, and suppression of annual grasses found in field corn grown for grain, seed, or silage as well as non-crop areas. Distinct is recommended to be used sequentially or tank mixed with a grass herbicide for a complete weed control program (refer to section V. General Tank Mixing Information).

#### Mode of Action

Distinct is absorbed by leaves, roots, and shoots and translocated to the growing points of sensitive weeds to provide postemergence control of emerged weeds as well as moderate residual control of germinating weeds. Distinct controls weeds by auxin transport inhibition and auxin agonist modes of action.

**Crop Tolerance** 

Corn is generally very tolerant to application of **Distinct**. Temporary injury may occur under conditions of crop stress or rapid growth. Crop stress can be caused by drought, poor fertility, other pesticides (i.e., other herbicides) or foliar damage due to hail, wind or insects. Injury can be avoided by agronomic practices that promote good crop growth and minimize stress conditions and especially combinations of stress factors. Crop leaning may occur during periods of rapid growth, but is usually temporary and dissipates within 7 days without subsequent yield reduction.

Corn growing under stress conditions such as drought, poor fertility, or foliar damage due to hail, wind or insects, can exhibit various injury symptoms that may be more pronounced if herbicides are applied.

Coverage

Weeds must be thoroughly covered with spray. Dense leaf canopies shelter smaller weeds and can prevent adequate spray coverage.

#### Cultivation

Avoid disturbing (e.g. tillage or cultivating) treated areas for at least 7 days following application to allow best herbicide uptake, translocation, and weed control.

Cleaning Spray Equipment

Clean application equipment thoroughly by using a strong detergent or commercial sprayer cleaner according to the manufacturer's directions and triple rinsing the equipment before and after applying this product.

# II. Application Instructions

Best product performance is obtained when **Distinct** Is applied to actively growing weeds. Weeds treated with **Distinct** will typically display symptoms within several hours and be controlled in 3-7 days. Treated weeds will stop growing soon after application. Broadleaf weeds will display epinastic twisting and crinkling symptoms before becoming necrotic. Suppressed grass weeds may display some epinasty and remain stunted and green.

Application Rates and Timings:Corn Distinct<sup>TM</sup> herbicide can be applied at the rates and growth stages listed in Table 2 in all tillage systems (e.g., conventional, no tillage, reduced tillage).

- Preplant Application in Reduced or No-Till Compistinct can be applied up to 7 days before planting corn using rates of 4-6 ounces per acre. When planting into a legume sod, (e.g., alfalfa or clover), apply 6-8 ounces of Distinct per acre after 4-6" of regrowth. Allow at least 15 days before planting if using more than 6 ounces per acre.
- Very Early Postemergence
   For very early postemergence applications (spike through 4" corn), use 4 ounces of Distinct per acre.

- ' Com height is measured to the arch of the highest leaf that is more than 50% emerged.
- Allow at least 15 days before planting if using more than 6 ounces per acre.
- Use up to 8 ounces of Distinct per acre for enhanced perennial weed control or increased annual grass suppression

For early postemergence applications (4-10" corn), use 6-8 ounces of **Distinct** per acre to provide knockdown and residual control through corn canopy closure. Early postemergence applications are recommended to minimize weed competition and maximize corn yield potential.

 Mid-postemergence
 For mid-postemergence applications (10-24" corn), use 4 ounces of Distinct per acre.

Split Applications
 Split applications of Distinct may be made during a growing season. Do not exceed a total of 10 ounces of Distinct per treated acre per crop year. Allow a minimum of 15 days between sequential applications of Distinct.

Application Rates and Timing:Non-Crop Use 4-6 ounces of Distinct per acre. The 6 ounce rate is recommended for enhanced suppression and/or control of perennial weed species. Apply to actively growing weeds.

Ground Application Methods and Equipment

As a wettable granule formulation, **Distinct** can be applied using water as the spray camer.

Water Volume: Use 3-50 gallons of diluted spray solution per treated acre. Use the higher water volume when treating dense or tall vegetation.

Application Equipment: Use ground application equipment that will provide good spray coverage of weed foliage. Exercise preventative measures to avoid drift onto nontarget areas. Spray drift from application equipment or the use of poorty cleaned equipment may cause injury to broadleaf crops such as tobacco and soybeans.

Avoid application when spray particles can be carried by wind to areas where broadleaf crops or plants are growing, or when temperature inversions exist.

Distinct should not be applied during periods of gusty wind or when windspeed exceeds 15 mph as uneven spray coverage may occur. Do not spray near sensitive plants.

sensitive plants. Use coarse sprays (volume median diameter of 400 microns or more) to avoid potential herbicide drift. Select nozzles that are designed to produce minimal amounts of fine spray particles (less than 200 microns). Examples of nozzles designed to produce coarse sprays via ground applications are Delavan® Raindrops, Spraying Systems XR (excluding 110° tips) flat fans, Turbo Teelets\*, Turbo Floodjets\*, or large capacity flood nozzles such as D10, TK10, or greater capacity tips. Keep the spray pressure at or below 20 psi and the spray volume at or above 20 gallons per acre, unless otherwise required by the manufacturer of drift-reducing nozzles. Consult your spray nozzie supplier concerning the choice of driftreducing nozzles. Agriculturally approved drift reducing additives may be used.

#### III. Additives

Adjuvants must be used with **Distinct<sup>TM</sup> herbicide** to achieve consistent weed control. The best results under most conditions will be achieved by combining a nonionic surfactant with urea ammonium nitrate. Refer to **Table 3. Additive Rates** for additive rates. Do not apply penetrants such as petroleum-based oils or methylated seed oils with **Distinct** as crop injury may result.

#### Nonionic Surfactant

The standard label recommendation is 1 quart of an 80% active nonionic spray surfactant per 100 gallons of water.

Nitrogen Source

Use a minimum of 5 quarts of urea ammonium nitrate (UAN; 28-34% nitrogen) per 100 gallons. Spray grade ammonium sulfate (AMS; 21% nitrogen) may be substituted for UAN at a minimum of 5 pounds per 100 gallons of spray mix. Use high-quality AMS (spray grade) to avoid plugging of nozzles. When using AMS, dissolve **Distinct** in the tank before adding AMS. Because most nitrogen solutions are mildly corrosive to galvanized, mild steel, and brass spray equipment, rinse the entire spray system with water soon after use.

Compatibility Test for Mix Components

Add components in the following sequence using 2 teaspoons for each pound or 1 teaspoon for each pint of recommended label rate per acre.

- Water: For 20 gallons per acre spray volume, use 3.3 cups (800 ml) of water. For other spray volumes, adjust rates accordingly. Use only water from the intended source at the source temperature.
- Products in PVA bags: Cap the jar and invert 10 cycles.
- Water-dispersible products: (dry flowables, wettable powders, suspension concentrates, or suspo-emulsions) Cap the jar and invert 10 cycles.
- Water-soluble products: such as Distinct. Cap the jar and invert 10 cycles.
- Emulsifiable concentrates: Cap the jar and invert 10 cycles.
- 6) Water-soluble additives: (AMS or UAN when applicable) Cap the jar and invert 10 cycles.

7) Let the solution stand for 15 minutes.

8) Evaluate the solution for uniformity and stability. The spray solution should not have free oil on the surface, nor fine particles that precipitate to the bottom, nor thick (clabbered) texture. If the spray solution is not compatible, repeat the compatibility test with the addition of a suitable compatibility agent. If the solution is then compatible, use the compatibility agent as directed on its label. If the solution is still incompatible, do not mix the ingredients in the same tank.

# IV. Mixing Order

- 1) Water: Begin by agitating a thoroughly clean sprayer tank half full of clean water.
- 2) Products in PVA bags: Place any product contained in water-soluble PVA bags into the mixing tank. Wait until all water-soluble PVA bags have fully dissolved and the product is evenly mixed in the spray tank before continuing.
- Water-dispersible products: (dry flowables, wettable powders, suspension concentrates, or suspo-emulsions)
- 4) Water-soluble products: such as Distinct
- 5) Emulsifiable concentrates
- 6) Water-soluble additives (Nonionic surfactant, AMS, or UAN when applicable)
- 7) Remaining quantity water

Maintain constant agitation during application. For more information, refer to section **V. General Tank Mixing Information**.

# V. General Tank Mixing Information

Distinct is recommended to be used sequentially or tank mixed with other herbicides as part of a complete weed control program. Tank mix recommendations are for use only in states where the sequential or tank mix product and application site are registered. Refer to section VII. Crop-Specific Information for more details and for specific tank mix restrictions. Local agricultural authorities may be a source of information when using other than BASF recommended tank mixes. Read and follow the applicable Restrictions and Limitations and Directions For Use on all products involved in tank mixing. The most restrictive labeling applies to tank mixes.

Physical incompatibility, reduced weed control, or crop injury may result from mixing **Distinct** with other pesticides (fungicides, herbicides, insecticides, or miticides), additives, or fertilizers.

#### VI. General Restrictions and Limitations

- Maximum seasonal use rate: Do not apply more than a total of 10 ounces of Distinct™ herbicide (0.438 pounds a.i.) per acre, per season.
- Do not apply if corn is more than 24" tall.
- Restricted Entry Interval (REI): 12 hours.
- Preharvest Interval (PHI): Do not apply within 32 days of corn forage harvest. Do not apply within 72 days of corn grain and stover harvest.
- Allow a minimum of 15 days between sequential applications of Distinct.
- Crop Rotation Restriction: Do not plant any crops within 120 days after the last application of **Distinct**. In the event of crop failure, corn can be replanted 7 or more days after application.
- Rainfast period: Distinct is rainfast 4 hours after application when used with recommended adjuvants according to section III. Additives.
- Do not use penetrants such as petroleum-based oils or methylated seed oils with Distinct as cropinjury may result.
- Do not apply to corn showing **injury** (leaf phytotoxicity or plant stunting) produced by any other prior herbicide applications, because this injury may be enhanced or prolonged.
- · Do not apply through any type of irrigation system.
- Do not treat irrigation ditches or water used for crop irrigation or domestic uses.
- This product cannot be used to formulate or reformulate any other pesticide product.
- Do not apply to areas where desirable legumes or broadleaf crops are present.
- Do not graze or harvest hay from treated areas.

# Corn Tank Mixes and Sequential Uses

In addition to control of many broadleaf weed species. Distinct offers herbistatic (suppression) of several annual grasses that may enhance overall control of your grass herbicide program. For commercial control of grasses Distinct should be used either as a sequential postemergence treatment following a pre-emergence grass herbicide (e.g., Frontier\* or Guardsman\* herbicides) or in tank mix combination with a postemergence grass herbicide (e.g., Accent<sup>e</sup> herbicide).

Distinct may be applied sequentially or in tank mixes with other herbicides registered for use in corn (including herbicides registered for use in corn hybrids tolerant to glyphosate, glufosinate, and imidazolinone) with the following limitations:

Distinct is not recommended for use in tank mixes with plant growth regulating herbicides such as those products that contain dicamba, 2,4-D, or clopyralid (e.g., Banvel\*, Celebrity\*, Clarity\*, Marksman\*, NorthStar\*, Weedone\* 64, Shotgun®, Scorpion® III, and Hornet™ herbicides). However, sequential treatments with these products may be used if applications are separated by at least 15 days. Additionally, Distinct is not recomended for tank mixing with Poast\* or Poast Plus\* on sethoxydim-tolerant com (Poast-Protected) varieties.

Distinct may be used sequentially with all soil-applied insecticides or used sequentially or in tank mixes with foliar-applied insecticides with the following

#### limitations:

Distinct is not recommended for use in foliarapplied tank mixes with Lorsban\*, Ambush\*, or Warrior\* insecticides. However, sequential treatments with these products may be used if applications are separated by at least 7 days.

#### Non-Crop Uses

FALLOW, FENCE LINES AND RIGHTS-OF WAY: Distinct may be applied to non-crop areas such as fallow areas, fence lines, utility, railroad and pipeline rights-of-way, and other non-crop areas. Do not apply to areas that include desirable grass species as injury may occur.
