EARLY STAGES OF STRAINS — LAMENESS — MUSCLE SORENESS — SWOLLEN TENDONS. (Due to exertion or fatigue).

Apply Pidge's Oil full strength three or four times a day. Bandaging should not be done until swelling has gone down. Animals should not be worked until all soreness has disappeared.

SADDLE SORES — CINCH SORES — COLLAR SORES.

Apply Pidge's Oil or Ointment freely three or four times a day. It is better not to work the horse. If the horse must be worked, apply the oil or ointment just before and after removing the saddle.

FOR TEMPORARY RELIEF OF:

WINDPUFFS

If used immediately Pidge's Oil will aid in reducing the windpuff and relieve much of the discomfort. Apply the oil full strength and bandage lightly. Keep the bandage moist with oil. Remove the bandage every other day.

QUARTER CRACK:

Apply Pidge's Oil full strength. Light bandage sufficient to keep dirt out of the crack. Keep bandage moist with Pidge's Oil.

THRUSH IN FOOT—CONTRACTED HEEL:

Open injury gently and clean thoroughly. Saturate cotton with Pidge's Oil and pack or pack with Pidge's Ointment. Be sure to get oil or ointment on the bottom of the injury. Light bandage to keep out dirt. Keep moist with oil or ointment.

ECZEMA- DRY

EczeMa is one of the most common disorders of animals. One of the chief causes is over-feeding of rich foods. EczeMa is often mistaken for mange. The first symptom is usually redness of the skin. It may vary from a small pimple to one or more spots as large as one's hand. There is usually considerable itching. Later the hair falls out leaving an angry red surface.

TREATMENT:

Apply Pidge's Oil or Ointment freely two or three times a day. **DO NOT BATHE WITH SOAP AND WATER UNTIL ECZEMA CONDITION HAS HEALED.**

MANGE: SARCOPTIC — HORSES - DOGS

Mange is a parasitic disease and easily transmitted from animal to animal. The first sign is usually intense itching. The animal is restless, scratches and bites constantly. The sores or affected area gradually increases in size. The sores scab over. The hair falls out and the animal gradually loses weight.

TREATMENT:

Wash thoroughly with a soft brush, warm water and soap until the scabs are removed. Rinse with warm water, dry with a soft cloth and apply Pidge's Oil or Ointment three times a day.

POULTICING AND BANDAGING:

Pidge's Oil may be used with heat. It may be bandaged or used as a poultice. Whichever is considered to be the most effective or advantageous.

FOR MINOR SKIN IRRITATIONS.

GUINEA PIGS, HAMSTERS

Pidge's Oil or Ointment will be found effective when used on such animals. It should be used only on a small area. It may be diluted with an equal amount of olive oil. The affected animal should be isolated from another animals.

INSECT BITES (non-poisonous).

FLY SORES TIP OF EARS:

Apply Pidge's Oil or Ointment full strength two or three times a day.

EAR CANKER: (Acute bacterial origin)

Inflammation of outer ear canal.

Use eye dropper and put 3 drops in each ear daily.

THE HAIR OR COAT:

Many exhibitors at dog shows, consistent blue ribbon winners and who's dog's coats cause much comment, follow this procedure:

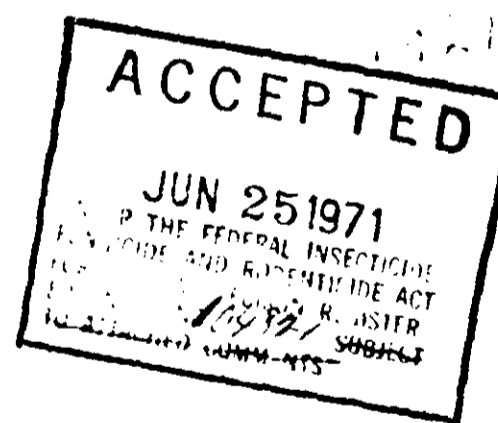
Apply Pidge's Oil freely. Massage it gently into the skin. Repeat each week, until the hair has about reached its usual length. Light bandage or dog blanket may be used for the first few days if desired. Bathe infrequently and apply the oil after each bath.

WARNING: DO NOT rub oil in vigorously on THIN SKINNED ANIMALS.

APPLY VERY SPARINGLY.

WARNING: Do not use on CATS.

SUPERFICIAL CUTS — BURNS — ROPE BURNS — BRUISES Apply Pidge's Oil or Ointment three times daily. (Do not bandage).
