### WARNING:

May be fatal if swallowed. Do not get on skin, in eyes, or on clothing. Wash thoroughly after using. Can be absorbed through skin. Do not breathe dust.

This product is toxic to fish, birds, and other wildlife. Keep out of lakes, streams, or ponds. Do not contaminate water by cleaning of equipment or disposal of wastes. Rinse equipment and dispose of wastes by burying in noncrop lands away from water supplies. Do not reuse containers for other purposes. Avoid contamination of feed and foodstuffs.

### ANTIDOTE:

**INTERNAL:** Give sodium chloride 15 g (one tablespoonful of table salt) in a glass of warm water and repeat until vomit is clear. Call a doctor immediately.

**EXTERNAL:** Wash with soap and water.

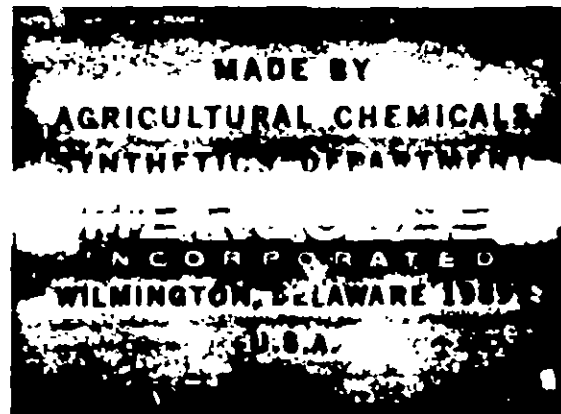

**PHYSICIAN'S NOTE:** Toxaphene produces central nervous system excitation that responds to barbituric acid derivatives. Prevent or control convulsions with barbiturates, preferably administered intravenously. If the barbiturate can be given before convulsions start, sodium pentobarbital is the drug of choice. Since toxaphene has a fairly long duration of action, a long-acting barbiturate such as phenobarbital may be used after initial control of convulsions. Refer to "Clinical Handbook of Economic Poisons," which was prepared by the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Public Health Service, Communicable Disease Center, Atlanta, Georgia.
