Dear Mr. Pirner:

Thank you for your recent letter of February 13, 2004 forwarding South Dakota's Department of Environment and Natural Resource's recommendations on air quality designations for the national health based standards for fine particles.


Your letter is an important step toward providing citizens in your state with critical information about air pollution levels in their community. We intend to carefully review the recommendations and work with Brian Gustafson, Administrator, South Dakota's Air Quality Program as necessary in determining final designations.

As explained in the attached guidance, our April 2003 PM<sub>2.5</sub> designations guidance established the metropolitan area (i.e., the larger of the Consolidated Metropolitan Statistical Area (CMSA) or Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA)) as the presumptive boundary for PM<sub>2.5</sub> nonattainment areas, based on the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) 1999 definition of CMSA and MSA. We acknowledged in our April 2003 guidance that OMB planned to publish revised urban area definitions sometime in 2003, but because the specific release date was not known at that time, the guidance stated that the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) anticipated using the 1999 definitions for the PM<sub>2.5</sub> designations process. OMB subsequently issued revised urban area definitions on June 6, 2003. While we are not requiring states to use the recently-issued OMB urban area definitions, EPA does intend to assess all counties included in OMB's 2003 definitions, as well as any adjacent counties, when reviewing each state's recommendations. All counties will be reviewed using the 9 factors identified in the April 1, 2003 guidance.
