There are impaired waters in Lunenburg that the MS4 discharges into and that require the development of a TMDL, as listed on the 2012 Integrated List of Waters, including Lake Shirley and Mulpus Brook. Once TMDLs for these waters are approved, further evaluation is required to determine whether the pollutant of concern is likely to be found in stormwater discharges from the MS4.
