

Part II. Self-Assessment

The Town of Abington has completed the required self-assessment and has determined that our municipality is in compliance with all permit conditions. We anticipate focusing on updates and refinements to existing documentation and programming until such time as the new permit, dated April 4, 2016, and modified conditions of operation under the permit, becomes effective. The provisions of the new permit were scheduled to go into effect on July 1, 2017, however, the EPA has postponed the July 1, 2017 effective date for one year to July 1, 2018. In preparation for the implementation of the new MS4 General Permit, the Town, in the fall of 2017, prepared a draft Notice of Intent in accordance with the provisions of the new permit. The Town will be prepared to finalize and submit the NOI within 90 days of the effective date of the permit, as required. The Town recognizes responsibilities related to the pathogen TMDL approved for the Taunton River and its tributaries, several of which are within the Town of Abington. Specifically, Beaver Brook, Cleveland Pond and the Shumatuscasant River have demonstrated pathogen impairments (fecal coliform) for which intensified educational efforts and BMPs will be evaluated. These and other waterbody segments are identified in the draft NOI, in accordance with the new permit requirements.
