Dear Mr. Speers:

It has been brought to my attention that I should inform you and your department of my plans to reconstruct an old dam.

The dam has been in existence since 1881, and was reconstructed in 1958. Through disuse the dam has deteriorated and I am intending to reconstruct it with the technical assistance of the Soil Conservation Service. I understand that your authorization to dam this intermittent stream is necessary prior to the S.C.S. consideration of a design for reconstruction of the dam.

My purpose in reconstructing the old dam is to provide an attractive habitat for wildlife and to control the water level of a small marshy mosquito breeding area that now exists in the summer months, caused by stagnant pools created by this fluctuating water level. The stream is intermittent depending on the amount of rainfall as to the amount of flow- dry spells no water, after a rain the water flows. To the best of my neighbors knowledge and mine the stream never has had a fish in it.

The site is on the "Castine" quadrangle of the Coast and Geodetic Topographic maps and is located $44^{\circ} 21' 09''$ latitude and $68^{\circ} 48' 42''$ longitude.

I am anxious to start this project this coming spring and would appreciate your consideration.

SUBJECT: Engineering

I didn't mention in my December 18th letter that you should inform Commissioner Ronald Speers of Maine Department of Inland Fisheries and Game, Augusta, Maine, that you plan to build a dam. I may have mentioned to you when I saw you that state law requires a person to inform the Commissioner of plans to dam a brook. You can tell him that the site is on the "Castine" quadrangle of the Coast and Geodetic Topographic maps and is located $44^{\circ} 21' 09''$ latitude and $68^{\circ} 48' 42''$ longitude.

The Commissioner will send his biologist to look at the site for recommendations. The Commissioner will then approve or disapprove the biologist's recommendations. It may be spring before the biologist can check the site for fish. I will need a copy of the Commissioner's authorization also before I can design the dam.

A letter from a landowner to the Commissioner sometimes brings prompter response than one from the Conservationist to the Commissioner does. The Commissioner can see by that that the landowner is the one who requests assistance and makes his own decisions for such use of his resources.

I suspect that you plan to get a formal agreement with the adjoining property owners that will give you flowage rights and the right to build part of the dam on their land. I would also appreciate having a copy of those rights before designing the dam.

Thank you for your letter of 18 December in regard to the estimate of the cost of the dam. This estimate more or less corresponds with the one that I came up with this past fall. I asked Mr. Snead if your presence would be helpful in the respect that Mr. Young may have some questions about this wildlife pond that I may not be qualified to answer, he thought it would be a good idea to have you come. If you think this is a worthwhile thing to do I would sincerely appreciate your taking the time to come out.

One other consideration may be this, through this small effort Callahan will get to know you (maybe they already have) and thereby a feeling of cooperation will begin to develop on the part of Callahan Mining and the S.C.S. This may just be wishful thinking on my part, but it has been prompted by the telephone calls I have received from Callahan here in New Jersey seems as though they are willing to cooperate on just about anything. I remember that you expressed a hope that they would be cooperators with the S.C.S.

I also have some questions about the dam and would like to clear them up so as to start the dam as soon as the ground conditions permit.

I sent the forms you gave me to Miss Harris of the Holbrook Island Sanctuary and she tells me she has filled them out and sent them in to you. I hope some constructive measures will come of this in regard to the restoration of the marshes disturbed by the mining operations at Goose Pond. Yes, I do subscribe to the Ellsworth American and sincerely hope that the TAP continues to progress with the problem and Mr. Wiggins will give it good coverage, as he has to date.

I will be at Harborside for about three weeks and will give you a call as soon as I get there.



SUBJECT: Dam Estimate

A rough estimate of an earth dam using a pipe spillway would be \$500 to \$700 including the pipe materials. This estimate is based on a 3-foot water level. I estimated that the dam would be about 100 feet long where its 5-foot height ties into the banks. Earth fill by the site usually figures about \$1 per cubic yard. The pipe materials will cost about \$130 to \$160.

A concrete structure would be much more expensive. Concrete usually runs \$100 per cubic yard, due to necessary steel reinforcements.

The type of dam we design is something like the following:



Riser can have flash boards inside
for use in controlling water level

The old dam may need to be removed for insurance of a sound structure. We can tell with further investigation.

I hope this answers your questions. If not, please feel free to contact me again.

Carl Rogers said he was planning to send you the results of our recent meetings with Callahan and with the County Commissioners. Do you subscribe to the ELLSWORTH AMERICAN? This has given very good coverage of the situation so far.


Dear Mr. Sandecki:

Dear Mr. Young:

Thank you for your letter of November 20th. I am pleased to hear the mine has no serious objection to this proposed daming of the intermittent stream that exists between our properties. I will assemble the plans for this pond and will discuss the idea with you as soon as all the information is at hand.

I have signed a cooperative agreement with the Hancock County Soil and Water Conservation District and will do my best to abide by the plans that will be developed by the board of supervisors. I as well as the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture and the Soil Conservation Service would like to feel free to contact you and your firm in regard to these plans.

In answer to your question on flooding danger if the dam should break or wash out. I think there is always this danger, but an effort will be made to insure against this happening by a proper and sturdily constructed dam. If such a thing should occur I believe the terrain would permit a runoff into Goose Cove.

I have investigated your other questions, the clearing of the area to be covered by water will be at the recommendation of the S.C.S.. I personally would like to see a minimum of clearing,- possibly only those alders that would be flooded out. As far as a breeding area for mosquitoes is concerned, I have been assured by Mr. Richard Duncan of the S.C.S. that a depth of water would be a far less desirable breeding ground for the mosquito than what now exists,- namely, small stagnant pools of water now caused by a fluctuating flow of water.

There is needless to say a danger for children near any body of water or pit and I am aware of it. I will do my best to warn my children as any parent should do, and hope that others will do the same. I will take up other precautions that the S.C.S. might suggest in regard to this. Which leads me to ask you a question. While at Harborside this fall I noticed posts in a regular placement across Oyer's hill is the mine intending to fence in the operations area or the open pit?

I have one other question. I think your firm owns the old dam now in existence,- if I am to reconstruct this dam and put my time and labor into it, is there a possibility or a necessity of purchasing a right from your firm to connect this dam to your property? I would like to hear from you on this point.

Happy to hear you have considered a community float in the cove area and would like to see the convenience come into being in the future.

I am looking forward to my pumphouse commission and want to thank both you and Mr. Hall for the permission to do the job. I hope it does not lead to any adverse criticism.

I will be at Harborside in January to paint (pictures) and possibly we can discuss things at that time.

Dear Mr. Sandecki:

Mr. Hall has asked me to review your proposed wildlife pond to be located in the area between your house and Penobscot property. On a preliminary study, I can see no serious objection on the part of the mine, although I would like to go over the plans with you in detail. Is there any danger of flooding, in the event the dam should break or wash out?

There are several questions I suggest you investigate in planning the project. Does the area to be covered by water need to be cleared before flooding? Is there a possibility of insufficient water flow during the dry season, that might cause the water to stagnate and form a breeding place for mosquitoes? Is there a danger for children by having a body of water that close to dwellings. I am especially aware of the many accidents that happen to children in private swimming pools and irrigation ditches, throughout the country.

I also have a copy of your recent letter regarding the painting of the pump house. If I am not here, when you are ready, co-ordinate with Joe MacGuffie. I am sure you will have to wait until spring and warm weather.

We have often thought of the possibility of a community dock or float in the cove area, but have delayed serious consideration, until construction in the area is complete. I believe anything of this nature would require the approval of the group, but imagine they would go along.

We can discuss all these matters on your next visit.



Hope I'm not adding too much to the clutter on your desk.

Enclosed is a letter to the Dept. of Agriculture, Soil Conservation Service, Ellsworth Maine. This represents a project of mine intended when I purchased the property in Maine.

Quite frankly I was rather hesitant to carry through when your operation commenced. I did however contact the S.C.S. and they were kind enough to send out Mr. Duncan a soil conservationist. He was quite enthusiastic about my intentions and made several helpful suggestions, you might say he roused my hopes of the project.

In researching some old deeds I have found that on April 5th 1881 a Mr. Dyer deeded land to a Mr. Cram who later deeded this land to the Rosier Gold and Silver Mining Company (recorded in volume 177 page 294 Hancock County Registry of Deeds) and therein the dam I am talking about is mentioned. Dear Mr. Dow:

Mr. Duncan has referred me to you in regard to further information for assistance on planning my pond.

In mid October Mr. Duncan was out to inspect the proposed pond area and made a few rough drawings of the area of the pond. He asked me to get estimates on the digging work needed and to decide on the amount of money I wanted to spend on the project, as well as the type of pond I wanted to develop.

I have received an estimate on the back-hoe work needed to dig to bedrock for a new foundation for the dam, and minor reconstruction of the old earthworks for the area nearest the old dam. This estimate was given to me by Mr. Frank Fowler of Brooksville, Maine.

Also I have received an estimate on the amount of labor and materials needed to construct a new dam, and will employ a Mr. James Steele of Brooklin who has some experience in constructing dams. I spoke with him at Mr. E.B. White's project in Brooklin.

The cost of the project should not exceed \$500.00 dollars, as I intend to do a good bit of the work myself.

The type of pond I would like to develop is one for water fowl, keeping it in as much a natural state as possible. As of now the pond or low area in existence is marshy I would like to keep it secluded as it is now, with plenty of cover and just maintain a constant level of water. As it is the stream that feeds this pond is intermittent, and Mr. Duncan made mention that he doubted that the Bureau of Sport Fisheries would object to the damming of the small stream.

My neighbors bordering on the left and right of my property are in favor of this pond. The Callahan Mining firm owns the land on the other side of the marsh area, and I am in the process of securing their permission to restore the old dam. I sincerely hope that they will be accord with my intentions to create favorable habitat for wildlife and waterfowl, between our properties.

I would like to request at this time any information that would help me to coordinate my help and materials needed to reconstruct this dam this coming summer. I would like to plan this winter to facilitate a smooth operation.

What I would like to get is specifics in regard to small dam construction, attached are some sketches and information that might help you in your suggestions.







Know all men by these presents that I, David Dyer of Brooksville, Maine, in consideration of five thousand dollars and five hundred shares of the capital stock of the Rosier Gold and Silver Mining Company's (Maine) paid by Edward B. Cross of Portland Maine, the receipt whereof I do hereby acknowledge, do hereby give, grant, bargain, sell and convey unto the said Cross his heirs and assigns forever a certain lot or parcel of land lying in said Brooksville and described as follows: Beginning near the shaft now being sunk upon a vein or mineral by the said Rosier Gold and Silver Mining Company (Maine) and known as Shaft No. 2 at the center of the vein or veins now being worked by said Company and from the center of said vein or veins whose general direction is South, West and Northwesterly as far as now known, three rods on each side of said vein veins holding the width of three rods from said center on each side as aforesaid throughout the entire length of said vein or veins said vein or vein being upon the land now owned and occupied by said Dyer and for said description of said property reference may be had to a certain deed from Joseph Bennett to said David Dyer under date of December twenty first 1880 and recorded in Hancock Registry Book 99 Page 24, and another certain deed from Robert Redman to said Dyer dated July 6th 1868 and recorded in said registry Book 66, 191 including all all rights spurs and angles of said veins or vein upon said line together with a convenient right of way to and from said vein or veins, the privilege of erecting buildings, machinery and all ~~the~~ the usual and necessary rights and privileges incident to and connected with the carrying on of mining operations reserving to said Dyer all crops wood and grass upon said premises, said Dyer in gathering said crops wood and grass not to interfere or interrupt said Company in the use and occupation of said premises; said Dyer also grants to said Cross his heirs and assigns forever the right of keeping and maintaining the dam to the artificial pond in the Western field of said Dyer's farm and the right to tunnel and carry the water across the land of said Dyer to the buildings of the company, said tunnel to be carefully covered so as to notto interfere with the cultivation of the soil, with the right to enter and repair said dam and tunnel.

And I do covenant with the said Grantee his heirs and assigns that an lawfully seized in fee of the premises, that they are free of all incumbrances, that I have good right to sell and convey the same to the said Grantee to hold as aforesaid, and that I and my heirs shall and will warrant and defend the same to the said Grantee his heirs and assigns forever, against the lawful claims and demands of all persons.






PLAN VIEW



I am writing in regard to your article for the summer issue of the Maine Fish and Game Magazine Vol. IX, No. 3

I own a small piece of property in Maine which has a small marsh area on it. I would like to request any help you can offer in regard to the development of this area in order to make it attractive to waterfowl.

I have contacted Mr. John Keif of the S.C.S. of Hancock County in regard to this project and he has been most helpful.

My main concern seems to be the lack of information in regard to the construction of a proper earthfill dam. I have written to the U.S. Dept. of the Interior- Bureau of Reclamation and have received information on dams. The difficulty seems to be that I cannot get any sort of information on SMALL DAMS, I am not about to go into the production of electricity as it seems the Department of the Interior would like me to do.

The approximate dimensions of this dam will be 5 foot in height and 30 feet in length. The soil is most suitable for the bed of the dam as well as the pond, quite clayey.

Any information available would be appreciated.


